

## ANSWERS TO TRIVIA QUESTION

1. The Curved Dash Oldsmobile, which debuted in 1901, was sold for \$650. Oldsmobile manufactured 425 of them that year.

2. A 1969 Dodge Charger. You might have noticed the producers sometimes substituted a model year 1968 or 1970 Charger in some shots.

3. While there were organized racing events before the turn of the 20th century, the first race called the Grand Prix occurred in France in 1906.

4. Many remember the Model T as the first car to be mass-produced. However, the Duryea was actually the first production auto, meaning more than one at a time were made. Thirteen practically identical cars rolled off the factory floor in 1896.

5. The first traffic signal. The red and green signal lights were operated by a traffic officer sitting in a nearby booth.

6. Cars had to crawl along freeways and interstates across the country at a maximum speed of 55 mph.

7. The Honda Accord holds that distinction, being manufactured in Ohio in 1982 rather than being shipped to the States from overseas.

8. Some automakers installed lap belts as standard equipment decades earlier, but the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration made them mandatory in all new cars on Jan. 1, 1968.

9. Surely you remember the stylish Gran Torino.

10. A notoriously congested Los Angeles.
